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Introduction

Finding the right words

How many times do we want to say something in another language but we can't find the words?

Learning a language means that you start with a few words and phrases and slowly add to them. It is hardest in the early stages, because there's so much you want to say and you only have a small number

- Check your work by looking back at the lists.
- Finally, use the Answer key to mark and correct your work.

You will find that some words and phrases are more useful to you than others. You need to focus on these and try to learn them so you can use them. You don't have to learn every word or phrase.
