





MEETING PEOPLE

- 1 We've all felt some fear when we've been invited to a party or asked to talk at a work meeting or conference. Both social and professional events can be scary for the shy and even the most confident. But why? For most people, it's the social interaction in these situations. We have to make small talk and we have to find things in common with a complete stranger – this is not easy. Need some help? Read our tips below.

ICEBREAKERS

- 2 The first thing we need is some easy questions to ask. Keep it simple at first. For example, if you're at a party, you could ask: *How do you know the host?* If it's a work conference, you could ask: *Where do you work / What department are you in? Do you know ...* Don't be afraid of asking personal questions – people like talking about themselves. Just make sure the questions aren't too personal. The idea is that you find some common ground to make conversation easier. As soon as you find things in common, you'll find that you suddenly have a lot of things to say to each other.

BE POSITIVE AND NICE

- 3 Most people like a compliment. Who doesn't like to be told that their job is interesting or that they tell funny jokes? If you're at a party and you don't know the host very well, start by admiring the home. You could say: *What wonderful views you have!* If it's a work event, maybe you've heard a talk by the person you're speaking to. In this case, you could be honest and say: *I heard you give a very interesting talk last year on ...* This will lead to more conversation openers. However, don't be too nice. Give people compliments about things you really like about them. If you give a false compliment, they might notice and think you're insincere.

BE A GOOD LISTENER

- 4 Sometimes when we want to give a good impression we make the mistake of speaking too much; we think we have to impress our listener, so we tell our stories and share our experiences and forget to ask about the other person. Everyone likes sharing, so make sure you ask questions to find out about your new friend and more importantly, listen! To actively listen, use words and body language to show interest. My favourites are: *Really? Wow, how interesting!* and *Well, I never knew that!* This will make the conversation a positive experience for both of you. But, remember, don't be afraid of silence – it's a normal part of conversation.

BE YOURSELF

- 5 This is the most important thing to remember. Everybody likes honesty, so don't be afraid to make jokes and be yourself! Be respectful, but don't be too polite. Over-politeness can make people feel uncomfortable. You want to make both of you feel comfortable, so be open and relaxed!

Pieces of writing are usually organised into paragraphs. Paragraphs make it easier for a reader to find the information they need. 





How does memory work?

Have you ever experienced a moment when a sound, sight, taste or smell made you feel happy or sad? Perhaps a song reminded you of something you used to do or somebody you used to know?

Or maybe a specific sight or smell made you think of something you were doing at a particular time in the past? Everybody has experienced this at some time; in fact, nine out of ten people experience this at least once a day. Our senses are important in order to help us recall key moments, events and even people in our lives. But how does memory work? And why do we connect particular things with certain memories?

The brain is a complex part of our bodies; in fact, it is the most complex part we have! It is made of about a billion *neurons* and these help the brain to remember. The *hippocampus* is near the centre of the brain. It's responsible for keeping important memories and remembering where things are. It helps us remember the way to work, or where you left your keys.

The hippocampus is very busy. The action of remembering something is quite complicated! When your brain records memory, it usually records other details, such as where you were at the time, who you were with, and what you were eating. This explains why other small things, for example a certain smell or taste, can activate memories and make you think of something in the past.

Important information, like addresses and friends' names or things with a strong emotional connection, are stored in our long-term memory. In fact, we often connect feelings with memory. Feelings can have positive and negative effects on our memories; the sound of a song that makes you think of a happy moment or the sight of something that makes you feel frightened.

So can we trust our memory? Some memories are recorded better than others because of the large amount of information the hippocampus needs to process. However, sometimes when we remember, our brains can make small changes to the memory, mixing old memories with new details and changing it. This is why we sometimes think a particular event happened when it really didn't happen at all!

The best way to improve your memory is to keep it active. The more often you recall a memory, the easier it is to find! Doing exercise, getting at least seven hours sleep at night and developing new skills will keep your memory active and improve your ability to remember at any age!







INDIA

2 Known for its cuisine, India has a rich and varied menu when it comes to meals and breakfast is no different. A typical breakfast in India will depend on the region and is different from north to south, but we've picked some of our favourites. Breakfast itself can be spicy and vegetarian options are common. *Chai*, or tea, is a popular option with breakfast. Breads such as *roti* or *dosas* are served with different yoghurt dips and fruit chutneys. Spiced potatoes, rice, vegetables and stuffed pancakes are other common options. With so much choice, it's difficult to decide what to have!

SPAIN

Not to be missed, however, is the *café con leche* – a strong cup of espresso with hot milk. If you try it, you won't be disappointed!




WALES

The key ingredient of the *laverbread cake* is seaweed, collected from the sea and boiled. This is then mixed with oats and fried in butter. A savoury morning treat and a healthy option, too!

JAPAN

Three ways to de-stress and be happier

Studies show that nine out of ten people feel like they don't have enough time to slow down and relax. Stress levels are higher than ever before. So how do you deal with stress? Read on to discover ways to manage and reduce your stress levels and live a healthier life.

1 Laugh more

With the day-to-day pressures of work, study and family, it can be hard to remember to slow down and enjoy all the good things in our lives. The healthy things. The *funny* things. Laughter has been found to decrease levels of stress and increase the production of chemicals that make us feel good.



Martin (28) from London tells us about his experience.

'When I'd finished university, I felt like I just didn't stop, there was always something to do – pass my driving test, get a good job, get married, have children. I became so focused on the things that I had to do that I forgot to smile and laugh and enjoy my time with friends. Last year, I decided to take more time for myself. Now, whether it's watching a funny film or **joking** with friends, I make sure I take time to laugh every day and I've never felt better.'

Studies show that taking time to take a new course, gain a qualification or develop new skills is one of the best ways to beat stress and help us to feel calm and relaxed. For example you could sign up for an evening class to learn how to cook or make furniture, or if you'd rather stay at home you could do a course online.



Maggie (43) from Cambridge tells us how she did it.

'About five years ago, I started designing clothes for my friends. I had a really busy job in an office and creating my own clothes at the weekends really helped me relax. I created my own website and suddenly everybody wanted to buy my clothes! I had to quit my office job so that I could meet the **demand** and continue to make clothes. Now I do what I love every day. It's stressful, but it's good stress because I'm doing what I love!'

Going on holiday is not just enjoyable, but it's also necessary for good health and reducing stress levels. Many of us spend more hours than we should sitting in offices, and just a little break can make a difference. A holiday will give you something to look forward to and you'll work better when you get back to the office.



Dave (38) from Melbourne says,

'I felt like I couldn't stop thinking about work. I wasn't able to switch off, even at the weekends. I knew I needed to do something different and a wildlife safari in South Africa was the **solution**.'

Whether you have the time and the money to go on a long trip like Dave or simply go on a camping trip nearer home, you should try to get away from the office – even for 24 hours – because it's been shown to reduce stress and increase levels of happiness. So go ahead, **book** your holiday today!

The two words are also important because they are now part of so many languages around the world. The words can be **interpreted** in various ways, including a modern way of saying hello, and a way of getting someone's attention. It's also possible that this structure represents the ethnic and cultural diversity in the different neighbourhoods in New York. But of course, like any form of public art, it's for the **passerby** to decide.

2 was created in 2000 and is considered one of the most original sculptures in Singapore. It shows a group of five boys jumping into the river. They're thought to be the first immigrants in the country who used the river as a huge swimming pool. According to the sculptor, the river was a playground for those who **didn't have very much**, but found enjoyment and adventure there. It shows positive feelings of a moment of happiness **frozen in time**. It's an image of humanity and hope.

3 is an unusual (and sweet) piece of artwork located in a small, private museum in Barcelona. If you like art, history ... and sweet foods, then this **is the place for you**. You could eat most of the sculptures here, but I'm not sure you would be popular with the museum if you did! You'll also learn about well-known buildings in the city. Just don't eat them!

The 4 sculpture can be found in the British Library's courtyard. The figure is the father of the Enlightenment. But this tribute to the great man is not very traditional if you **look closely**. The sculpture was **based on** a picture by a famous artist, William Blake, who didn't like all of Newton's ideas.

5 is the least cheerful sculpture on our list, but it's an important memorial to honour the victims of the fascist regime in World War II. The shoes represent the lives lost at the banks of the river in Budapest, Hungary. There are 60 pairs of shoes made of iron. Any passerby will stop and **reflect on** this sad period in history. A powerful exhibition and a **touching** memorial.



What does traditional education mean to you?

Probably very teacher-centred lessons with little communication between the students. You might remember strict teachers and strict rules. You might also think of sitting exams and trying to get the highest marks. We explored two other types of schools to see if there was an alternative to the system we have. Each school has a unique method of teaching, which is far from traditional. Here they are!

Brooklyn Free School is for primary and secondary school students. In fact, its youngest students are only four. The school's philosophy is very different from traditional education. To give you an idea: imagine a school where the students make the rules and choose their classes. More surprisingly, they have a policy which means students don't have to go to class if they don't want to. They don't have to revise for tests because there aren't any! They don't have to hand in homework every day because they decide if they want to do it or not! This means that at the end of the year, there are no grades. If the child has a problem, he or she can ask for a meeting and discuss it with the entire school. If a student is bored of a subject, such as chemistry, he or she can get up and walk out, or go to the lounge and read a book all day. Some students spend years on 'independent study', where they can do any projects they like. The students are completely independent during this time. Others take classes like screenwriting, architecture or something related to sports. The key concept here seems to be freedom to choose

Microsoft's School of the Future also breaks from tradition. Even the building looks like something out of the future! You might guess from the name of this school that every student needs a laptop to attend this public secondary school in Philadelphia. The system in this school prepares students for the digital world of work when they finish school. Instead of textbooks, students use their laptops, and new technologies are used in the classrooms. This school also encourages children to participate in arts and music. There's a school choir and band and students can continue with these activities if they show real talent. For students who attend classes and show good behaviour, there are rewards and events to show them that doing well in school can be fun. The fees aren't cheap, but you don't have to buy textbooks and by sending your children here, you're also helping the environment.

Like everything else in the world today, education is changing and perhaps these schools are leading the way!




